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Wetlands Project Will Bring Cleaner Water to the Lake and Provide an Enhanced Habitat for Our Wildlife

Pine Lake's wetland project began as an idea a number of years ago with the goal of supplying more clean water to Pine Lake and cleaning up the stream. Now, just three years later as the project nears completion, the whole community can begin to enjoy the fruits of a long journey.

The first steps were developing a formal plan that would be approved by the state Environmental Protection Division, and finding funding. We went to work with Manhard Consulting, a nationally recognized environmental engineering firm, to develop a plan

and figure out a budget for the project. We discovered funding was available through the Clean Water Act of 1972. The Clean Water Act establishes a list of impaired streams, rivers and other waterways that have serious pollution problems and makes funds available to local governments and groups to correct the pollution problems. The stream that flows through Pine Lake, Snapfinger Creek, is on the list for fecal coli form, the same pollution that makes us have to close the lake during the summer



to swimming. We submitted a grant application to the Georgia Environmental Protection Division of the Department of Natural Resources with a plan to clean up the fecal coli form in Snapfinger Creek and received a grant of \$217,495 that required a local grant match of \$145,000. The local match has been largely provided by several volunteer efforts on the part of Pine Lake residents and a contribution of machinery and labor from DeKalb County. I have been told that our volunteer efforts are remarkable for a community our size. We frequently had turnouts that would be expected only from a much larger communities.

The basic idea behind the project was to clean the fecal coliform out of the water. In case you don't know, fecal coliform comes from poop of all sorts. Here in Pine Lake it is caused by geese, old septic tanks, and dog poop that doesn't get picked up. All of us need to remember that rain washes these contaminants into the lake. When we don't pick up after our dogs and cats, we are polluting the lake. Even if you don't live on the lake, runoff from your yard and the streets goes into the storm drains that lead to the lake and stream.

Septic tanks that are still being used need to be properly maintained and serviced. When a septic system isn't properly cared for, it saturates the ground and seeps into the ground water. Of course we have a community challenge because of the major County sewer lines that run

through the City. We all need to be diligent and report any suspected sewer leaks. Please report them to City Hall immediately. We will contact the County and have them dispatch a crew to clean it up.

To remove the fecal coliform from the stream and lower the count in the lake, the water must be filtered. The

best natural way to do this is to create a system of wetlands that the water runs through before it gets to the lake. We first must assure that the wetlands have a reliable source of water. This is being accomplished by repairing the old dam area so there is a constant flow of water coming from Snapfinger Creek to the flume that supplies Pine Lake. This step still needs a little work but is about 90% complete. Next we are in the process of constructing artificial wetlands upstream from the lake. The water from Snapfinger Creek will be diverted through the constructed wetlands, then be allowed to enter the lake. The lake water will be much cleaner then but we are still not finished. The lake water will overflow through a drain and enter a second artificial wetlands downstream from the lake, be filtered again and reenter Snapfinger Creek, hopefully free of fecal coliform.

This is a work in process. It will take a couple of years to complete. There will be some stops and starts as funding comes and goes. I have just completed the second round of negotiations with DeKalb County and we will resume work on the upstream portion of the wetlands the week of May 26. We hope to complete the upstream portion within thirty days of that date weather permitting.

Our wetlands project will not only clean up the water, but will provide a superior habitat for our wildlife. We also have a Department of Natural Resources Trail Grant for about \$99,000 that will enable us to put in a trail system with benches and educational signs. All of us will be able to observe the wetlands and enjoy our wildlife in a pretty park setting.

Why Our Pets Must Be on a Leash

A recent story in PLAINTalk left me sad and frustrated: sad for a friend of mine who lost a cat; sad that our neighbors can't remember to slow down; and frustrated for the failure of the recurrent messages about the leash law to be heard. While we all understand the reason for a speed limit, the reasons why we have a leash law are soon forgotten. Pine Lake originally established a leash law for cats and dogs in order to maintain its "Bird Sanctuary" designation. Many committees have convened to discuss the pros and cons of the leash law and decided that it was important to maintain the "Bird Sanctuary" designation.

We have worked to get a portion of our city listed as a wildlife sanctuary for six years, but we were met with obstacles including pets being observed off the leash by agency professionals. The wetlands projects will result in creating water features that attract birds and wildlife that can not live near a big lake, because those smaller animals would be open prey to hawks and other natural predators. These water features will increase our chances of getting a "Wildlife Habitat" designation, but only if we reduce the number of domestic predators (off the leash) that have access to

our wetlands.

The "Wildlife Habitat" designation is an honor that is often recognized when federal and state agencies are deciding to fund projects. Phil has done wonders with about \$300,000 in grant funds that has already created habitats. The new wetland grasses, now growing upstream, will attract many birds and the improved spillway will result in a cleaner lake. Later this year we will be planning the \$100,000 wetlands boardwalk (the grant that Kathie and Brent received for us). This will allow us (and our pets) to get close to observe the new species. Next year we hope to develop the Western Wetlands habitat.

Between the contributions of you, the county, the state, and the Feds, these will be considered a combined multimillion-dollar wetlands asset. Such an asset will attract migratory fowl to a region that is losing its wildlife. It will certainly make us deserving of additional wildlife funds.

I respect my neighbors love for their pets. (A tall stone marks the grave of my cat Sinbad, of 21 yrs.) But I urge my neighbors to remember and respect our leash law.

2008 Pine Lake Park and Beach Rules

The Park and Beach are open from 6am to 9pm daily, except for the Western Wetlands, Eastern Green Space and the back side of the lake which close at dark.

Current Park cards are required for use of our park and lake. Park cards are available at City Hall.

Swimming is allowed only from Memorial Day weekend through October 4, 2008.

1. Swimming is always at your own risk.
2. Adults may swim outside of the roped area but within the berm by signing a waiver form available at City Hall or from the Beach Manager.
3. Children 12 and under must be accompanied by an adult and swim within the roped area.
4. **Fishing requires a park card. No fishing in the swimming side of the berm.**
5. **Honor the "Pooper Scooper" law.** Pick up any pet waste and dispose of it properly. Plastic bags are provided in containers at trash cans.
6. **Do not feed the geese, ducks, and other birds.** It upsets their digestion and interrupts their migration pattern. Nature provides plenty of appropriate food.
7. **No dogs or pets are allowed off-leash, in the lake, or on the beach at any time.**
8. **No glass containers on the beach or in the park.**
9. **Alcoholic beverage consumption and public drunkenness are not allowed at the park and beach.** Alcoholic beverages are only allowed during special and permitted events.
10. **Smoking is prohibited on the beach.**
11. **Honor the noise ordinances and litter laws.** Keep our park and lake clean, beautiful and enjoyable for all.

Enjoy our Pine Lake nature and environment responsibly and respectfully.

New Playground Update

Thanks to the support of our community, the playground committee has had two highly successful fundraisers since its inception last July. Trash Talk

The city offers the service of picking up items and debris that will not be picked up by the regular trash service and disposing of it in the city's dumpster. Many times our city workers will pick up small items or loads free of charge. Larger items and piles will be removed for a small fee. The charge is roughly equal to \$30 per man-hour plus the prorated cost of disposal, i.e. dumpster, tractor or truck time. This usually works out to a minimum of \$5. for a light-weight load about as big as half a

wheelbarrow, up to \$30. or more for larger loads.

The following items **cannot** be put in our city dumpster and should never be left out in the street:

- **Paint cans with wet paint in them.** (For proper disposal, see box below.)
- **Old tires.** The place where you buy new tires will dispose of old tires for a small fee.

• **Excessive construction debris.** We likely can accept a very small pile (think a wheelbarrow full) of scrap wood or sheetrock if it can be quickly and safely hand loaded into our city truck. We reserve the right to refuse any construction debris. It's a judgment call that will be made at the time of pickup. Charges will apply for the disposal of construction debris.



Any appropriate debris will be picked up by the city workers on Monday and Tuesdays ONLY. We don't want our neighborhood to constantly have trash set out on the street, so please, do not put out trash to be picked up until Saturdays or, preferably, Sundays.

How to Dispose of Old Paint

Open the cans of paint, put cat litter or sand in them and allow to completely dry out. Double bag the dried out paint cans, and then we can dispose of them in the city dumpster. **NEVER dump old paint in any storm drains, in the street gutter or in your yard.**

This paint will end up in the stream, violates the EPD hazardous waste laws, and hurts the entire community. Persons caught doing this will be cited and fined.

Notes from the Tree Board

The initial round of tree and shrub plantings in the eastern wetlands was completed last month. The plantings in this area (at the far eastern end, above the dam) consisted of 'live stakes' along the restored streambed and a variety of trees and shrubs in the former streambed and adjacent area.

The 'live stakes' planted along the new streambed are black willows and silky/swamp dogwoods. They are designed to grow rapidly and densely in a very wet environment in order to secure the new streambed.

The plantings on the far side of the creek include the following: American beech trees, a red buckeye, a river birch, a gallberry/inkberry holly and a possum haw (viburnum). In addition, the area was over-seeded with a mid-height wildflower mix.



Public Hearings of New Zoning

After months of discussion, dialogue, and research, Alycen Whiddon and Associates are finalizing several important documents. Whiddon has submitted a draft of the zoning codes for Resident and Uptown (business) areas, as well as application and administrative procedures for the Architectural Review Board.

Copies of these documents are available to the public and will be discussed at upcoming public hearings. There official public hearings will be held on Saturday, June 9 at 10:30am at the Beach House for citizen input. These hearings are the culmination of nearly 25 meetings with large numbers of Pine Lake home and business owners.

Could you lose your Homestead Exemption?

YES! If you have a vehicle not currently registered in DeKalb County, you could be at risk of losing your homestead exemption! Increased code enforcement in the city will result in more residents receiving warnings and citations for this violation of state and county law. You must register your vehicle in your primary place of residence!

Public Works Update

The upstream portion of the wetlands construction project is closer to

completion, thanks to the planting by volunteers (see "Notes from the Tree Board," pg 7); work on the downstream portion continues. (See Phil's article, front page.)

Public Works collected over 6 dumpsters of trash and debris during the recent Trash Amnesty Days!

A few geese were re-located to north Georgia in late April; another removal is scheduled in June, after the geese molt.

The city does provide a beach manager whose responsibilities are to monitor the beach, and ensure that everyone follows the posted rules. Lora Donna is trained in CPR and has direct access to public safety officers, and asks your help in having a safe and enjoyable swimming season. Please remember that children under 12 must always have an adult present (no more than 6 children per adult, please). If you are an adult swimmer who wants to swim outside the roped area (but within the berm), you can get a special release to do so: ask Lora Donna, or come by City Hall.
